

Since 2017, she's raised nine puppies and provides a range of positive exposure opportunities before they enter formal training. She cares for new puppies in the intensive first two months, teaching toileting, walking on lead and good behaviour. Tracey is an inspiration to other potential volunteers, with her calm, matter of fact approach, sharing openly what is required as a puppy whelping volunteer and encouraging others to step into this vital role. Through her willingness to help, Tracey has helped to pave the way for other volunteers and ensure the sustainability of Guide Dogs Tasmania's guide and autism assistance dog training program. Wetsuits, boards, and hi-vis t-shirts are provided to ensure everyone's safety and inclusivity, and the music, encouragement, and laughter flow freely.

The Albert Street Gang was on the 2023 Women in Waves Day panel with Layne Beachley and featured in a Brand Tasmania award-winning film. While based on the North West Coast, the outreach of the gang is much wider, with more than 900 members across the gang's social media platforms. The trio say the true inspiration is in the faces of the young and old in the moment of elation when they are on their feet and dancing across the waves.

Deloraine Community Tassie Garden

Tassie Mums is a volunteer-based group that is passionate about providing essential items to babies and children in need. The statewide service collects donations of new and pre-loved items including clothing, cots, prams, bottles, school bags, lunch boxes, toiletries, car seats and more.

The donated items are sorted and bundled according to gender and age. Tassie Mums is connected with more than 65 charities and government organisations that pass the bundles on to those in need. During this financial year Tassie Mums has been able to provide more than \$400,000 in donated goods.
